

Dear Director:

SUBJECT: FIRST PERFORMANCE National Day of Celebration—A Beginner
Demonstration Concert

We can all remember the excitement of our FIRST PERFORMANCE—dressing uniformly; being the center of attention yet within the security of a group setting; and especially hearing the rousing applause of an excited and supportive audience. These are all memories that last a lifetime. Certainly, a fully programmed concert is desirable from the director's musical standpoint but with beginners, there will never be a more enthusiastic group of performers and audience members than these young musicians and their family and friends. A demonstration concert at this stage in their development can help ensure a strong program overall.

The objectives of FIRST PERFORMANCE are:

- · To reduce beginner dropout rate.
- · To provide short-range incentive goals.
- To encourage communication with parents.
- · To further strengthen administrative support and
- · To celebrate the musical accomplishments of the students.

The FIRST PERFORMANCE kit contains all of the concert support you will need including:

- · A sample letter/invitation to parents.
- A sample letter/invitation to administration.
- A fillable PDF Certificate of Advancement.
- · A complete 20-minute concert with scripted narration.

All you will need to supply is:

- Appropriate performance material to play during the performance, likely either from your beginning band method book or from Music Achievement Council's own "First Performance – A Demonstration Concert" publication.
- A representative from your school administration, parent organization or the high school director to serve as the narrator.
- Advance publicity across the school and community including posters and school-wide announcements. (You may want to have a contest to design an appropriate cover.)
- Light refreshments to be provided following the performance
- Printed certificates for each student musician celebrating this major achievement.

It is recommended that the date of the FIRST PERFORMANCE gets announced at the first parent meeting to ensure that it is recorded in the parents' calendars. A simple statement such as, "On _____(date and time), we will be back together to hear the progress of this year's group of young musicians, so mark your calendars for our FIRST PERFORMANCE. You won't want to miss it."

Remember, FIRST PERFORMANCE NATIONAL DAY OF CELEBRATION has been designed as a demonstration of progress. Many of the materials referenced above are also posted online at www.musicachievementcouncil.org so that they may be downloaded and personalized for your particular situation.

The Music Achievement Council and your local music dealer hope that this event will help in your efforts to bring the joy of instrumental music-making to many children in your school.

f. Ideas to Enhance the Experience with HS Students

Ideas to Enhance the Experience of the FIRST PERFORMANCE NATIONAL DAY OF CELEBRATION by Involving High School Band/Orchestra Students

It is important to remember that students of this age look up to their older peers so involving high school band/orchestra students can serve to motivate the beginners and their parents to stick with it. Reach out to your high school directors to become involved by:

- Asking high school students (in uniform) to serve as ushers to distribute programs as people enter.
- Asking high school students (in uniform) to "meet and greet" the parents/students as they begin to show up to the warm-up area.
- Asking like-instrument high school students (in uniform) to assist in tuning the instruments for the beginners.
- For band, arranging for the entire high school marching band to burst into the performance area (as a surprise) playing the high school fight song just prior to the final selection. After students play their final selection, ask the high school band students to congratulate (i.e. highfive) the beginners.
- Arranging for a high school student combo (or several soloists) to perform at the post-performance reception.
- Asking high school students to send a congratulatory note to a beginner who played a like-instrument being sure to write something like, "looking forward to seeing you in our high school band/orchestral"


